Unfinished Business

The report from the ad hoc committee regarding Grading and Credit Point Systems was distributed to the Council prior to the meeting. The first report dealt with the current policy regarding the issue of a grade of C- not counting toward a graduate degree. Because plus/minus grading is not consistent across campus, students could earn the same percentage score in two courses or two sections of the same course, and one would count toward their degree and the other would not.

Example

- o Student B scores 70% in BasketWeaving 702, receiving a C and 3 credit hours
- o Student A scores 73% in BasketWeaving 701, receiving a C- and 0 credit hours

The committee recommends that the policy be changed to allow C- grades to count toward the graduate degree. This would be a revision to policy 3.19-9.

The discussion that followed included several faculty members stating that often faculty in their departments were not aware that a C- could not count toward a student's degree. There was discussion

about the differences in the cumulative GPA (which may affect eligibility for assistantships and scholarships) and the GPA of the courses used in the degree audit, which must average 3.0 in order to graduate. The suggested change from the committee would not impact these metrics, nor other policies related to grades such as program dismissal.

Dr. King called for the vote and the Council unanimously approved that a C- should be allowed to count toward a degree.

The second, related issue that the ad hoc committee reviewed was the Grade Table (policy 3.04-31: Grading and the Credit Point system). This grade table reflects the implications of grades for undergraduate students but contradicts the implications for graduate students. The discussion that followed showed widespread agreement that a second table should be developed, once the C-recommendation is addressed.

Dr. Michael Hudson, Faculty Senate Chair, recommended that both issues (C-, grade interpretation chart) could go to Faculty Senate as an action item after the Graduate Council makes the final recommendations on both issues.

Dr. Smith and the ad hoc committee will now work with Dr. King and Dr. Masterson to determine the next steps.
